Hi Ray and Dave,

You may recall the attached Adelaide Race Dance in Trad & Now in 2010. I think it is a great dance and it provides the use of galop tunes which have tended to miss out in the Australian tradition. Part of the problem was the dance (Galop) itself had ceased to be popular by the first decade of the 20thC so had disappeared before aural tunes had survived for the collector's. The Two Steps which derived from the Galop did survive, but the Collectors ignored them because of an association with the modern Foxtrot or Quickstep.

I've assemble some really good galop tunes from old tune books, mainly a series called "Daisy's" which was piano dance music for children. Daisy Sutton of Wedderburn co-incidentally had some of them. It is possible some of these could have moved into the aural tradition, although they have either not been found or recognised and linked to these.

Thought I could do Adelaide Race Day next year at Bundanoon, or possibly even this year (2013) at Goulburn. Also, the Oldtimers Two Step is in galop style and a 40 bar tune, I've adjusted the dance to 40 bars to include a swing which the original dance didn't have, yet I feel a dance such as this would have had a swing, had it been in the aural tradition.

See what you think, more tunes on the way, in batches because of the MB. Peter.

They are all 40 bar tunes to suit my adaptation of the dance, if for any reason you wanted 32 bar tunes, leave the first line out, that is a tag I put in using the main strain of a verse. So the remaining 4 lines are the main tune section.

Oldtimers Two Step is a natural 40 bar collected tune from the playing of three of the Oldtimers, Daisy Sutton, Jack Condon and Lionel Collison. This is the tune version known in "the bush", that is districts around Wedderburn. However if you needed a 32 bar version then Elma Ross's is the one to use, obviously same tune and in fact Elma's coincides with a tune from Jean Murphy of Mitta Mitta, except she has a second part in Eb. Elma's is a great tune for Galopede Country Dance (also known as La Galopede) and could be used for any "set tune" such as in Lancers or Alberts, as well as of course for the Two Step.

It is actually called "Waltz Mazurka" as it is tune specific for a dance by that name. Connie Whitwell, Ma's friend, was there as well as Ma's daughter Mary, and between the latter two, I was able to reconstruct the dance. Ma was grumpy as usual, singing out, "doesn't the music tell you what to do?" I was getting the blame, but daughter Mary was putting in a reverse Viennese Waltz which obviously was wrong according to Ma. We actually filmed it in Bendigo with this Viennese Waltz and sent it over for Ma's scrutiny. Connie worked it out, also saying they thought we'd confused it with the Varsovianna in the second section. We reworked it deleted the Viennese Waltz and altered the Varsovianna turn and stop to a more subtle Hesitation Waltz waltz stop while bringing the other foot up to the ankle instead of stopping on the floor. This seemed to meet with approval.

So the first 16 bars is straight Circular Waltz, the second section which is strongly marked with some Varsoviana part B emphasis, consists of 2 mazurkas forward, polka step half turn (as in Varso), then a natural waltz turn one way, bringing the foot up to the other ankle, then repeated reverse direction. This part B section of 8 bars is then repeated mirror image or reverse pattern to the previous. Then back to Circular Waltz etc. Merro remembered Ma waltzing round and round while playing the tune on an earlier visit, but by the time of my visit she was 90 and not dancing.

NB. Ma's grumpiness which Merro didn't seem to pick up on. We'd been recording her for some time when she said "what about you playing a tune Mr Meredith, who's the mug around here!" Also on our return, she didn't want to see us, sitting in a rocking chair with an Afghan crochured rug over her knees, pretending to be a disinterested old lady. Once we got the tunes going, it was a very different story, and she'd look me in the eye at the end of each piece.

He was born September 23, 1883 in Stromstad and died there on April 7, 1965 at the age of eighty-one.

As a young man he enlisted in the Royal Bohuslan Regiment, where he studied music and played the French horn. He returned to civilian life after attaining the rank of sergeant.

After leaving the military Hellstrom continued with his musical activities, composing both waltzes and marches. He often worked with lyricist Goran Svenning. In 1907 the two men submitted Kostervalsen in a Bohuslan contest for the province's best new melody. Their entry was disqualified when the jury ruled it was 'too suggestive'. Despite the setback, the partnership endured and produced many memorable songs.

In 1962 David Hellstrom was awarded the Fred Winter prize for his contributions to Swedish music."

History: I learnt the tune from Jamie Carlin, one of the stalwarts of the Bush Music Club when I first went. We were performing at Australiana Village near Sydney one Sunday and Jamie remembered it and played it when I asked if he knew any of Sally's tunes. Sally was a life member of the BMC in recognition of her immense contribution to Australian folk music. A formidable woman who showed me once, quite forcefully, how to do the varsovienna. I have a copy of Sally playing the tune in Meredith's first collection from the National Library. They couldn't find it presumably because the name you used is not as Meredith named it. Sally played it for a figure of one of the quadrilles so he just noted it as a "set tune". It is on cassette and it will take some time to locate it and transfer it for you. [I have just gone to check the index of the collection and it is listed on tape 14 A Item 3 as "Set Tune". I have handwritten on this that it is "just as Jamie played it". The index doesn't specify what instrument she played (She was adept on fiddle, box, whistle, and I think concertina though she didn't have one)] It is interesting to note that in your recording and music the triplets in the first two bars which are eminently suited to box players and awkward on the fiddle have been adapted to suit the fiddle and yet played on the box. Ah, the folk process.
